America 250 Programs: America, Ohio, & Huron -Linked in History

"Let Ohio Women Vote" Documentary Film Discussion

Tuesday, March 11 at 5 p.m.

Professor Kimberly Hamlin served as the historical consultant for the CET/Think-TV documentary "Let Ohio Women Vote" and is available for screenings and/or discussions of the 60-minute film, produced by Ann Rotolante. "Let Ohio Women Vote" chronicles the role of Ohio women in securing the vote — from Frances Wright, who in 1828 became the first woman to speak in public in Cincinnati, to Oberlin graduate Mary Church Terrell who became the founding president of the National Association of Colored Women in 1890 — and highlights Ohio's important role in women's activism. The film points out the vital links between abolition and women's rights and connects the story of the 19th Amendment to ongoing debates about voting rights and voter access. Viewers will be encouraged to think about what issues propelled women into activism, the role of race/racism in securing women's right to vote, and the connections between women's personal and political lives.

Ohio's Lake Shore Electric Railroad System Tuesday, May 13 at 6 p.m.

For three decades, from 1900 to 1930, the electric interurban railway played a major part in the economic life of the Midwest. By 1915 Ohio had 2,780 miles of interurban track, transporting passengers and cargo until the popularity of automobiles and buses lead to its collapse. During that period the Lake Shore Electric Railway operated routes from Cleveland to Detroit, via Avon Lake, Lorain, Vermilion, Huron, Sandusky, and Toledo. Highlights of this presentation will include photos of passengers, stations, stops, bridges, trains, and route maps of Huron, Ohio and its surrounding communities. **Presented by the Huron Historical Society**
